May Program

Rock Doc Dave Millis will give a presentation on cleaning mineral specimens at the May meeting.

When we collect minerals in the field (which, to my mind, is the pinnacle of rockhounding), we usually have to find them in the midst of lots of gangue, as miners would say. Because of the limited time we have available at the collecting site, we can't do much more than minimize the amount of weight we have to take home.

At home, though, there's much to know about cleaning things up for storage or display (or later trading). And certain minerals need special storage for preservation. (One of my favorite hints: never put specimens loose in a drawer—the act of opening and closing the drawer will cause damage over time. You should always put some kind of spacers or packing around individual items to prevent rolling and collisions.)

Bucketite

As I was looking for stuff suitable for the mini-mine I remembered the article in our Shin-Skinner News that was making the rounds in the newsletters in the early 2000.

Author unknown and perhaps recycled through many decades of newsletters.

"Bucketite. This is a type of rock that forms in buckets, milk crates, boxes, and other containers in the backyard and garages of long-time rockhounds. Its properties vary widely: any color, texture, or hardness may be found in these deposits. Often the best material is found in small pieces at the bottom of the container; great patience is needed to sift through a typical deposit. These deposits are typically pretty filthy, though the stones are easily removed and cleaned. Beware of spiders and other vermin, especially in larger deposits and in hot climates. On the other hand, the material is quite often pre-slabbed, and the slabs will already have cabochon outlines marked on them. How can you tell if a piece of rock is bucketite? If you can't tell what it is and someone asks you, just tell them it is bucketite. If you got it out of a bucket, even if you know what it is, it is still bucketite, not to be confused with backyardite, which is an other story altogether. " There is also Cantrememberite and Cantquitespellite. I'm sure most of us old timers have a quite extensive vocabulary for these type of rocks. Inga challenges you to send in some of your own vocabulary you use for the stuff without labels in your collection.
