Kid Safety

There is a very nice article in the October 2017 AFMS Newsletter entitled "Safety Matters - Kid Safety", by Ellery Borow, AFMS Safety Chair. (Download the whole newsletter at http://www.amfed.org/news/n2017_09.pdf.)

Its theme is that, while the dangers of field collecting are the same for kids as adults, the mitigations are not. Here are its main points:

- Softer safety goggles are needed to fit smaller heads
- Get right-sized heavy duty gloves
- Use very adjustable hard hats
- Some smaller sizes can be found for steel toe boots
- Smaller tools are safer
- No matter what you do, some (commercial) locations won't allow kids
- **Don't be unsafe around kids**—they watch and learn from adults
